

After they break the fast, Muslims perform the fourth prayer of the day. Muslims offer five prayers daily at special times.



Islam is the religion of Muslims around the world. Muslims celebrate the festival of **Eid-ul-Fitr**.

Some Muslims gather at the mosque or remain at home to break the fast. This is called **Iftar**. They then share a meal.



After dinner, Muslims line up for the last daily prayer and also the **Taraweeh prayer**. The Taraweeh prayer is only performed in the month of Ramadan.



Eid-ul-Fitr occurs when the new moon is seen at the end of the month of **Ramadan**, the ninth month in the Islamic calendar. This year the month began on April 14th.

Ramadan is the month when the first verses of the Muslims' holy book, the Qur'an, were revealed. The Holy Qur'an teaches Muslims how to live. During the Month of Ramadan, Muslims **fast**.

When Muslims fast, **they do not eat or drink during the day**. They begin to fast from sunrise in the morning (around 4:30 a.m.) and end their fast at sunset in the evening (around 6:30 p.m.).

On Eid Day, Muslims get up early, shower, wear their best clothes and go to the mosque for the special Eid prayer. Meals are prepared at home including the traditional **sawine**. People greet each other with hugs and handshakes and say "**ASSALAMU ALAIKUM**" (Peace on to you). **There is no fasting on the day of Eid-ul-Fitr.**



Dates are used by some Muslims to break the fast. Others prefer a light snack.






Sawine is a traditional dish prepared and shared with visitors, friends and neighbours.


Eid-ul-Fitr during the Covid 19 Pandemic
