In the 1920's, Trinidad and Tobago was the third largest producer of cocoa. However, the crop was affected by a disease. Then, low prices and the start of the oil industry led to the loss of this crop.

Chocolate is made from cocoa beans. Today, our cocoa beans have made Trinidad and Tobago famous! The Trinitario cocoa bean named after our country has won many international awards. It is a fine flavoured cocoa bean that is used by to make high quality chocolate sold all over the world.

Examples of chocolate made right here in Trinidad and Tobago









Cocoa is planted in Trinidad and Tobago by persons, families and groups called cooperatives (people working together) on cocoa estates. An estate is a very large piece of land. Cocoa houses can still be seen on some estates today.











Step 1: Read the problem

John had 11 tomatoes. He gave 4 tomatoes to Marsha. How many tomatoes did John have left?




Step 3: Write the solution

11 tomatoes take away 4 tomatoes is equal to 7 tomatoes or

11 - 4 = 7 so John had 7 tomatoes left.


